



What was it from 1894 to 1975? And in a sense, after that too?

Akhnoor Dagger is a narrow strip of land in the Pakistan state of Punjab that as the name suggests stabs forth towards Akhnoor in India's Jammu & Kashmir.

What is the more common name for this region, inspired by the world of fauna, and more commonly used for a narrow strip in the eastern part of India?

This two word phrase, now often used in politics to refer to radical sections of a political party, originally referred to a sort of a haircut.
