It was part of Lung's story series The Monsters, which was influenced by the Nordic folklore and mythology that he was introduced to and enjoyed during his childhood. After X's sudden rise in popularity, conspiracy theories linking it to the ancient Mesopotamian wind demon Y began to crop up on social media, presumably due to the perceived similarity in appearance and the sound of their names.
